Leicester City Council has a dedicated Environmental Education Coordinator based in the Environment Team who works with schools to help them become more sustainable in all that they do.

As well as one to one support, schools are able to engage through half-termly #EcoTeachmeets, staff training, resource planning & workshops, an annual Eco-Schools conference & celebration event and keep up to date through a dedicated Twitter account, monthly eBulletins and termly newsletters.

The Eco-Schools programme provides exciting opportunities for students in curriculum time as well as outside the classroom. Learning outside of the classroom (LOTC) has been identified as 'memorable activities leading to memorable learning and positively contributing to pupil safety'. LOTC provides positive benefits to all groups of young people and supports a rich, relevant, broad and balanced curriculum.

Eco-School Awards

Schools can register for Eco-Schools for free at www.eco-schools.org.uk/register

There are 3 levels of award: Bronze, Silver and Green Flag.

At **Bronze** level your school has set up a committee, carried out a review, created an action plan and indicated where environmental issues are covered in the curriculum and informed the whole school.

At **Silver** level your school has done the above plus involved the whole school and wider community, carried out monitoring and evaluation, created an eco-code and completed one in-depth piece of work from the nine topics.

At **Green Flag Award** status, your school has done all the above plus carried out project work in-depth for three of the nine topics and adopted a procurement policy.

Bronze and Silver are self-certified online. For **Green Flag, schools submit evidence online** and are visited by an external assessor.

Schools can also be awarded an instant **Energy Award** based on their energy usage.



OFSTED are now looking for schools to show that they are engaging with the

Global Learning Programme - GLP

In their School Inspection Update of December 2015 (Issue 5)¹, OFSTED draw attention to the GLP as it 'maps onto the four Ofsted core judgements and to SMSC'. It is not up to the inspectors to ask if the school uses the programme, but schools can and should highlight how the GLP is contributing to their provision and outcomes for pupils.

What is the Global learning programme (GLP)? https://globaldimension.org.uk/glp

The GLP is a programme funded by the Department for International Development (DFID) which acknowledges that 'Every child growing up in the UK should have the chance to learn about the world around them, the facts of poverty and underdevelopment, and about the potential to build a freer and more prosperous world.' The GLP works with primary, secondary and special schools across the UK to support teachers and ensure pupils develop the skills needed to work in a global economy through learning about key themes of development education such as: knowledge of developing countries, their economies, histories and human geography, knowledge of the basic elements of globalisation, knowledge of different ways to achieve global poverty reduction and the arguments around the merits of different approaches. GLP is co-ordinated by Pearson UK, SSAT, The Institute of Education, The Royal Geographical Association, Think Global, The Geographical Association, Oxfam

The GLP aspires to engage a minimum of 50% of English schools





Looking after the Willow Brook

The Willow Brook flows through the eastern edge of Leicester where it joins the River Soar at Abbey Park. The upstream end of the catchment is mainly farmland with some small villages. The downstream end of the catchment within the city is very much urbanised. Poor management in the past has resulted in pollution reaching the water from both the rural and urban areas. Many of the natural features along the brook have been replaced with hard surfaces and concrete, particularly in the city. As a result, there is little wildlife and public access along the brook along with a risk of flooding in certain areas.

To address some of these issues Trent Rivers Trust is working closely with Leicester City Council and others as part of a project called WaterLIFE waterlife.org.uk. We are working with several schools, community groups and farmers to raise awareness of the importance of the water in the Willow Brook, delivering projects that will store water, trap pollution and provide habitats for wildlife. 


