Leicester City Council has a dedicated Environmental Education Coordinator based in the Environment Team who works with schools to help them become more sustainable in all that they do.

As well as one to one support, schools are able to engage through termly #EcoTeachMeets, staff training, resource planning & workshops, assemblies, Eco-Schools conferences & celebration events and can keep up to date through a dedicated Twitter account, monthly eBulletins and termly newsletters.

The Eco-Schools programme provides exciting opportunities for students in curriculum time as well as outside the classroom. Learning outside the classroom (LOTC) has been identified as 'memorable activities leading to memorable learning and positively contributing to pupil safety'. LOTC provides positive benefits to all groups of young people and supports a rich, relevant, broad and balanced curriculum. Welcome to the January Leicester Eco-Schools newsletter. Last term was immensely busy, not least because it was nearly 17 weeks! We ran the 6 Eco-Schools roadshow days, launched the healthier air for schools award, ran Eco-Schools training for school staff, for governors and for Primary PGCE students, we ran our first termly #EcoTeachMeet as well as attended a number of local teach meets. Eco-School Awards

Schools can register for Eco-Schools for free at <u>www.eco-schools.org.uk/register</u>

There are 3 levels of award: Bronze, Silver and Green Flag which were **recently updated in September 2017**.

At **Bronze** level your school has set up an Eco-committee, carried out a review, created an action plan for one topic and shared this with the whole school.

At **Silver** level your school has done the above plus involved the whole school and wider community and carried out monitoring and evaluation for one indepth piece of work on one of the nine topics. You have also identified where environmental issues are covered in the curriculum.

At **Green Flag Award** status, your school has done all of the above plus carried out in-depth project work for three of the nine topics and developed an Eco-Code which reflects the topics you have worked on.

Bronze and Silver are self-certified online. For Green Flag, schools submit evidence online and are visited by an external assessor at a mutually agreed time.







Fairtrade Fortnight 2018 'What's the impact?'

Many different ethical and environmental marks can be found on food products these days, but what do they all mean?

As part of Fairtrade Fortnight 2018 we are asking KS4 and KS5 students to research the different marks and the differences between them. As part of this research we would also like the students to speak to local retailers to find out which marks they sell, and why. Please focus on the marks to the right.

To enter students will need to produce a PowerPoint (up to 10 slides) or a written report (up to 3 pages) about their findings. Students can enter the competition individually or as part of a group (maximum of 3). Shortlisted entrants will be invited to present their findings to a panel of judges, including Cllr Clarke, Deputy City Mayor with responsibility for Environment, Public Health and Health Integration.

You can also enter the Leicester Fairtrade Schools competition as part of your research project if it involves carrying out a campaigning activity.

It was also great to see recognition for Katie France and the Living Streets project which won the healthy school award category. Watch out for next year's awards evening. Healthier Air for Schools Award

Poor air quality affects people's health and damages the environment. In Leicester there are two main pollutants of concern: nitrogen dioxide and particulate matter. The main source of these pollutants is road traffic, in particular diesel engines.

Leicester has an air quality action plan, a strategic approach to delivering better air quality. This action plan sets out how we will improve air quality and meet the EU standards for nitrogen dioxide, but we cannot achieve this alone. We are asking you to support tackling air quality by tackling parking around your school and actively encouraging sustainable transport for students, staff and parents. All schools can achieve the healthier air for schools awards.

You can submit your evidence at any time, however submissions will be reviewed monthly. Download the application form from the school extranet <u>schools.leicester.gov.uk/HealthierAir</u>

Email your completed form and evidence to Amita Miles, <u>Amita.Miles@leicester.gov.uk</u>. If we need any extra information or clarification we will be in touch. All schools who achieve the award will be invited to the celebration event at City Hall on **Tuesday 12 June 2018**.

Your award lasts 12 months from approval. *You will need to renew annually to maintain your award.*

In order to achieve a **pass** in the Healthier Air in Schools award you need to submit evidence of:

- Achieving at least your Silver Eco-Schools Award with the topic of transport covered
- At least 1 ongoing scheme for example Living Streets - Walk to School, Sustrans Bike It - which has lasted at least 2 school terms.
- At least 1 event involving parents and the community e.g. car-free day, clean air day, raising awareness of the problem of idling*

*(Idling refers to running a vehicle's engine when the vehicle is not in motion i.e. parking outside the school gates)

You can also achieve a **merit** by evidencing other activities in school

You can submit evidence of activities which have taken place in the last 12 months.

Safe Happy Family Day at Whitehall Primary School



By involving parents and children in the event, we hope they will think about changing the way they travel to school and help tackle the problems associated with congestion and parking in our schools."

Eco-Schools Roadshow 2017



Hundreds of local schoolchildren have been sharing ideas about how to make their schools greener as part of the Leicester Eco-Schools Roadshow. The month-long programme of workshops saw over 400 pupils from 31 local schools get together to learn about environmental projects and share ideas to promote sustainability.

Now in its second year, the roadshow visited six schools and worked with local partners to offer sessions on a range of sustainable issues including pollution and its impact on wildlife, growing your own food and helping reduce food and water waste, walking and cycling, and the importance of Fairtrade. Pupils from the host schools were also given the chance to showcase their own environmental projects. These included school recycling projects, litter reduction and energy saving campaigns.

Deputy City Mayor Cllr Adam Clarke, who leads on the environment and sustainability, said: "The Eco-Schools Roadshow is helping to get hundreds of children thinking about our impact on the environment and how they can help introduce green initiatives into their school lives. The schools have come up with some fantastic ideas and there is a real enthusiasm for tackling the challenge of living more sustainably, which we hope will spread to families and the wider community."





Hazel Primary School turning rubbish into art

Supports the recycling Eco-Schools topic



More than 180 pupils from Hazel Community Primary School took part in the project, which encouraged them to recycle materials from home and use them to create models and sculptures for display in the school. The artwork went on display as a pop-up exhibition at Leicester's Adult Education Centre, in Belvoir Street. Winners from each school year group were chosen by the city council's environmental education coordinator. They received certificates and prizes including gift vouchers and stationery sets made from recycled materials. The winning designs included a robot in school uniform, made from a pizza box and take away tins, and a dog, made from a plastic bottle and insulation tape. Artwork was brought into school after half-term and has since been on display in the school.

The aim of the project was to help children and families to think more about what they throw away, whether it could be recycled, and consider why it's important to recycle or reuse our rubbish. It will also help the school, which already has a silver Eco-Schools award, on its journey towards achieving a prestigious Eco-Schools Green Flag Award. Gillian Blatherwick, head teacher at Hazel Community Primary School, said: "We were overwhelmed at how successful this project was. It was great to see so many pupils get involved. You could clearly see it had been a whole team effort from children and their families". Deputy city mayor Cllr Adam Clarke said: "Environmentally-themed projects like this one get children thinking about how we use the resources around us, and as this project shows, that's a message that can then spread to the wider community. By making recycling and re-using waste 'normal' for the next generation, we'll be able to increase rates of recycling and reduce the amount of waste we send to landfill in the future."



What kind of waste appears on UK beaches? Items found per 100m



With Blue Planet II and recent news about China no longer accepting other countries' waste, it is now even more topical to be talking about plastic waste and how we can reduce it. Why not make it a new year's resolution with your class to reduce your plastic consumption? Plastic as we know it has only really existed for the last 60-70 years, but in that time it has transformed everything from clothing, cooking and catering, to product design, engineering and retailing. One of the great advantages of many types of plastic is that they're designed to last - for a very long time. And nearly all the plastic ever created still exists in some form today. Drinks bottles are one the most common types of plastic waste. Some 480bn plastic bottles were sold globally in 2016 - that's a million bottles per minute. Of these, 110bn were made by drinks giant Coca Cola.

The BBC has an excellent article about plastic waste with some very good graphs (some of which are here), that can be found on <u>BBC news</u>, or search for 'seven charts that explain the plastic pollution problem'.

More locally why not participate in our plastic milk bottle challenge? Carry out a survey of how many plastic milk bottles (and straws) your school uses ever week and see if you can some up with some clever ways of reducing them.



Plastic waste and milk bottles



Did you know? Last year Leicester City school children drank nearly 2 million bottles of milk!

We would like your Eco-team to look at how many bottles of milk your school drinks in a day (and a year) and how you might be able to reduce the amount of wasted milk, plastic and straws.

There is a very simple survey which can be downloaded from the school <u>extranet</u> or via <u>Survey Monkey</u>. The survey covers things like, how many milk bottles per day, week and year, how many straws and three questions about how you could reduce your waste. A very topical activity with news about marine pollution and helps with your Eco-Schools waste topic.


Energy monitoring and EDI-Net 🔨 EDI_Net



#EcoTeachmeets 2017-18


