As well as one-to-one support, schools are able to engage through termly #EcoTeachMeets, staff training, resource planning & workshops, assemblies, Eco-Schools conferences & celebration events and can keep up to date through a dedicated Twitter account, monthly eBulletins and termly newsletters.

The Eco-Schools programme provides exciting opportunities for students in curriculum time as well as outside the classroom. Learning outside the classroom (LOTC) has been identified as 'memorable activities leading to memorable learning and positively contributing to pupil safety'. LOTC provides positive benefits to all groups of young people and supports a rich, relevant, broad and balanced curriculum.

Eco-School Awards

Schools can register for Eco-Schools for free at www.eco-schools.org.uk/register

There are 3 levels of award: Bronze, Silver and Green Flag which were **updated** in **September 2017**.

At **Bronze** level your school has set up an Eco-committee, carried out a review, created an action plan for one topic and shared this with the whole school.

At **Silver** level your school has done the above plus involved the whole school and wider community and carried out monitoring and evaluation for one indepth piece of work on one of the ten topics. You have also identified where environmental issues are covered in the curriculum.

At **Green Flag Award** status, your school has done all of the above plus carried out in-depth project work for three of the ten topics and developed an Eco-Code which reflects the topics you have worked on.

Bronze and Silver are self-certified online. For Green Flag, schools submit evidence online and are visited by an external assessor at a mutually agreed time.

On 12 June 2018 we celebrated the hard work of schools in Leicester at our fourth joint Eco-Schools and Food for Life Celebration in City Hall. We warmly welcomed 15 schools along with over 35 guest judges including 6 City Councillors and representatives from many local and national environmental organisations. The event was an opportunity for schools to showcase projects which have taken place over the last 12 months

Activities came from a wide selection of project ideas including recycling, extinction, the refugee crisis, biodiversity and healthy eating. Judges commented again how difficult it was to pick winners with such enthusiastic students and staff. Following the more formal judging, students were given the opportunity to judge the other schools' stalls and pick their Eco-Factor. Prizes were kindly announced and awarded by Cllr Adam Clarke, Deputy City Mayor responsible for Environment, Public Health & Health Integration & Cllr Sarah Russell, Deputy City Mayor responsible for Children and Young People's Services. Outdoor learning spaces at Barley Croft







Barley Croft Primary School recently started on their journey to creating amazing outdoor learning areas for their children to experience more outdoor learning. In May they had over 30 parents and grandparents, 30 children and 12 members of staff come into school on a Saturday to improve 5 new areas in the school grounds.

Inspire a Generation ARCADIS











Learners from Eco-Schools in Leicester have been finding out about sustainability. Over 100 pupils worked with Arcadis experts to evaluate the sustainability features in their schools and make recommendations to improve the energy efficiency of each building. Over a number of weeks Arcadis volunteers worked with four the schools to help them prepare for when they shared their findings at the first ever primary Eco-Summit. School and Employer engagement brings learning to life. Every child taking knows more built part about the environment, our responsibility sustainable practices and has practised employability skills (they also had great fun). The four schools involved were Mellor Primary School, Stokes Wood Primary School, Forest Lodge Primary Academy and Eyres Monsell Primary. Car Free Day at Avenue Primary Day

In June, Avenue Primary School participated in support of improving air quality by taking part in a car free day. Parents were encouraged not to use the car for the morning and evening school run, opting for walking, cycling or using public transport.

In the week before, Year 6 participated in workshops about air quality. Children learned about what causes air pollution including the historical reasons such as the great Smog of London. They created posters to highlight the causes, problems and how to improve air quality. They also created 'pollution' monitors which were hung up at home. Finally they put up air quality monitoring tubes provided by National Friends of the Earth which have been sent off to analyse if there is any difference between the front and back of the school. The workshops went really well and both children and their parents found out a lot more about improving air. Packs can be ordered online in September or search 'Clean air school pack'.

Clean Air Day 2018







Children at a Leicester school were given a chance to enjoy a traffic-free street as part of national Clean Air Day. Glebelands Primary, in Beaumont Leys, worked with the city council and environmental charity Sustrans to close the road outside the school and take its classes into the street. Chancel Road was closed from early morning until 5pm on Clean Air Day itself (June 21), and at school run times on the two days either side of it.

Pupils, parents, guardians and school staff were encouraged to walk, cycle or scoot to school and leave the car at home. People who needed to drive were asked to park away from the school and complete their journeys on foot.

The whole school was able to use the closed street for an outdoor assembly, playtimes, chalk art and an introduction to 'kerby' – a traditional ball game played across the road. They also gathered in the traffic-free road to spell out a huge 'We love clean air' message. A special event for families was held at the end of the school day with fun activities and information stalls. Sustrans and Living Streets were on hand to offer advice on walking and cycling and the Dr Bike service provided free check-ups for people's bikes and scooters. Representatives from the police were also offering free security marking for bikes.

National Clean Air Day is organised by environmental charity Global Action Plan as a chance to find out more about air pollution, share information with friends, and help make the air cleaner and healthier for everyone.

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During the Great British Spring Clean 2018, children and young people from across Leicester's schools joined together to clean up their neighbourhoods for the Litter Less campaign.

Arranged in partnership between Eco-Schools and the city council, 15 schools both primary and secondary – litter picked their school grounds and the surrounding streets before joining together at Abbey Park to celebrate their achievements and help raise awareness.

Soar Valley College alone collected a child's weight in rubbish (over 7 stone) and by the time the 15 schools met up in Abbey Park, they'd collected a staggering 213 bags full of litter. And it wasn't just the streets of Leicester that benefited, as some of the young people involved explain, "it would be a great idea to do this every week... students learn about how important our environment is and why we should cherish it" – Jenni, year 11, Hamilton Academy.

"Fun and enjoyable whilst being good for our school and local environment" - Keira, year 9, Hamilton Academy.

Congratulations to all the staff and pupils involved in making this such an amazing, inspiring day. Joining with countries as far apart as Australia, Mexico, Kenya, China, Russia, India, Spain and Israel in this year's Litter Less campaign, together we are cleaning up the planet by caring for the environment on our own doorsteps.

Eat Like A Champ is a free, evidence-based healthy eating education programme aimed at primary school children aged 9-10 years -Year 5. The aim of the campaign is to tackle the growing issue of poor nutrition and obesity amongst children through six specially tailored lessons about healthy eating, hydration and staying active. The concept of Eat Like A Champ is to make healthy eating exciting, and to inspire children to adopt the healthy choices of champions they admire.

The content of Eat Like A Champ was written in collaboration with the British Nutrition Foundation to ensure that the lessons are of the highest possible standard, up to date with the latest government guidelines, and complement primary school curricula throughout the UK. The resources have been updated to reflect Public Health England's recent changes to the Eatwell Guide.

Many of our schools are using the resource including Catherine Junior School and Sandfield Close Primary School.





Food Waste in Schools

Environmental Education Leicester has recently been working with several schools to look at food waste, mainly in the dining areas. We have been using the Fab Foods Resources which have been funded by Sainsbury's.

Fab Foods gets pupils involved in reducing food waste in their schools, from measuring how much is thrown away to thinking up new ways to tackle the problem. The Fab Foods scheme has been trialed in schools up and down the country and has seen some fab results with the average school reducing food waste by 24% which has saved schools thousands of pounds a year.

We are hoping to roll this out to more schools in the autumn term - so if you would like to get involved just send a quick email.



This is carried out in all parts of the school: classrooms, kitchen, dini room, staffroom, playground. Children see how much food is being what types of food are most often wasted and start to work out why



Action Plan - let's see what we can do about it

Food Waste Audit – let's see what we waste

This is created by everyone involved. It uses the results of the Food Was Audit. Pupils and teachers plan ways to reduce the amount of waste for This includes deciding which activities are going to work best during Fo Awareness Week



Food Awareness Week - a week of Fab Food action This is a week of activities arising from the Action Plan. The activities can be carried out in class, across the school, through an assembly, or at home Together, they help make wasting less food fun and memorable.



Step 4: Audit – let's see what we've saved

Step 1 is repeated to see if the school is now wasting less food. The children analyse, reflect and report back on what they have learned and what else

Pen Recycling Scheme



Leicester School UnitEd



We are looking for schools that would like to take part in a pilot school linking project where a class from your school is linked with one from a demographically different school in another part of Leicester.

The aim of this project is to

- Develop a shared sense of identity
- · Improve community cohesion
- Challenge stereotypes and prejudice
- · Build friendships across Leicester

The structure of the project follows guidance of The Linking Network, a national organization operating for 16 years:

- · Heads express an interest in joining
- · A local facilitator brokers a link with another school based on priorities of both Heads
- Each Head signs an agreement to release a teacher for 2 training sessions, pay for transport to enable a neutral venue visit and a visit to the other school to occur and to host a visit in their own school and very importantly enable curriculum time for the classes to exchange work.
- · Teachers attend a training day in September
- · Classes exchange photos, names and identity work linked to the PSHCE, Art etc
- The two classes meet for the first time, preferably at our neutral venue, The St Philip's Centre in Evington, and take part in activities linked to wide ranging aspects of curriculum such as RE, Drama, Outdoor Sports, Speaking & Listening, Geography. The facilitators at the venue understand the programme and facilitate collaborative activities that support pupils to enjoy working alongside one another.
- Further work is exchanged between the classes including "curiosity questions" which deepen the contact. E-linking opportunities develop the IT curriculum and increase the children's sense of understanding and connection with the partner class.
- Teachers meet for a half day training in February to plan Spring or Summer Term visits to each other's schools.
- Further work exchanges and class visits take place.
- A celebration event is planned and a final exchange and goodbye.

This year sees the end of the fantastic Polli:Nation project. The project which has been running for 3 years has supported schools to develop pollinator friendly school grounds. Schemes have included wild meadows, fruit bush planting and surveys to monitor bees, bugs and butterflies. Through the project, children and young people learn about the range and role of pollinating insects and how to help them. Then they conduct specially designed surveys, created by universities and environmental charities, to find out which insects live in or visit their school grounds and community spaces.

The biodiversity and education project has been led by Learning through Landscapes (LTL), a charity dedicated to outdoor learning and play. They have worked with 260 primary, secondary and special schools around the UK of which 12 were in Leicester.

Fishkeeper Fry Project

Fishkeeper Fry is a short video-led course which has been designed and produced in line with core primary curriculum science themes by a team of expert fishkeepers to inspire and educate primary school children in the art and science of fish and fishkeeping.

All the livestock, guides and videos that make up the lessons within the programme are provided by the specialists at Maidenhead Aquatics, completely free of charge to the schools chosen to participate, sponsorship from popular aquatic brands Fluval and API means that each school class that participates in the programme will receive all the equipment they need to set up their aquarium.

All we ask in return is that those classes who are selected to take part share their experience with us as they go on their journey of discovery, in the form of journals, artwork and photos that we can use to share with our social and website audiences

New £25 million funding programme for maintained schools

Interest free funding available for maintained schools over the next 2 years

The RHS Campaign for School Gardening has launched an exciting **secondary schools** programme: the <u>Green Plan It Challenge</u>. This is the first time the challenge is coming to the East Midlands and we have chosen the first location to be Leicester, with the Challenge event days being held at the University of Leicester Botanic Gardens

Green Plan It Challenge

Over the course of 10 weeks in the Autumn term, students across the UK will be tasked with researching, planning and building a model showing us their ideas of what would make an innovative or exciting new garden for their school or local community.

School teams are matched with a mentor from the horticultural industry who will guide them through the project, offering their knowledge of plants and challenging them to think about the purpose of their design.

The project begins with a launch event for teams where activities, games and discussions will get their creative minds going and get them set for their challenge. At the end of the 10 weeks, students will compete against other local schools and present their designs at a celebration event to see who is crowned the winner. **Could your school be the first East Midlands Winner!?**

Walk Leicester



Encouraging walking as part of an active lifestyle

The Leicester Walking project provides short group walks in the city, encouraging adults to get more active by exploring the city on foot. The walks are free to attend and led by friendly project staff and trained walk volunteers. The Leicester Walking project can work directly with community groups and this offer is now open to schools who are interested in setting up walking groups for their parents. The aim is to support parents in an active lifestyle and encourage them to make more sustainable journeys on foot - a message which links with campaigns to combat school-run parking and traffic congestion in the city. Group walks are very sociable and can help participants feel more confident and motivated to get active and keep active.

"This group is amazing, I love it... first I was really slow but [I've] now built so much confidence in myself".

"I hardly walk, so this has got me and my family to become more active during the weekends".

The project delivers group walks for parents once-a-week for four weeks, led by project staff/ walk volunteers. Walks last between 45 - 60 minutes, starting at the school in the morning (after drop-off) or alternatively at 2pm (before collection), whichever option is most popular with parents. After the initial four weeks, interested parents attend a walk leader mini-training session to enable them to keep their group walking as a self-led group. 




