Leicester City Council has a dedicated Environmental Education Coordinator based in the Environment Team who works with schools to help them become more sustainable in all that they do.

As well as one to one support, schools are able to engage through termly #EcoTeachMeets, staff training, resource planning & workshops, assemblies, Eco-Schools conferences & celebration events and can keep up to date through a dedicated Twitter account, monthly eBulletins and termly newsletters.

The Eco-Schools programme provides exciting opportunities for students in curriculum time as well as outside the classroom. Learning outside the classroom (LOTC) has been identified as 'memorable activities leading to memorable learning and positively contributing to pupil safety'. LOTC provides positive benefits to all groups of young people and supports a rich, relevant, broad and balanced curriculum.

Eco-School Awards

Schools can register for Eco-Schools for free at www.eco-schools.org.uk/register

There are 3 levels of award: Bronze, Silver and Green Flag which were recently updated in September 2017.

At **Bronze** level your school has set up an Eco-committee, carried out a review, created an action plan for one topic and shared this with the whole school.

At **Silver** level your school has done the above plus involved the whole school and wider community and carried out monitoring and evaluation for one indepth piece of work on one of the nine topics. You have also identified where environmental issues are covered in the curriculum.

At **Green Flag Award** status, your school has done all of the above plus carried out in-depth project work for three of the nine topics and developed an Eco-Code which reflects the topics you have worked on.

Bronze and Silver are self-certified online. For Green Flag, schools submit evidence online and are visited by an external assessor at a mutually agreed time.



Fairtrade Fortnight 2018 'What's the impact?'

Many different ethical and environmental marks can be found on food products these days, but what do they all mean?

As part of Fairtrade Fortnight 2018 we are asking KS4 and KS5 students to research the different marks and the differences between them. As part of this research we would also like the students to speak to local retailers to find out which marks they sell, and why. **Please focus on the marks to the right.**

To enter students will need to produce a PowerPoint (up to 10 slides) or a written report (up to 3 pages) about their findings. Students can enter the competition individually or as part of a group (maximum of 3). Shortlisted entrants will be invited to present their findings to a panel of judges, including Cllr Clarke, Deputy City Mayor with responsibility for Environment, Public Health and Health Integration.

You can also enter the Leicester Fairtrade Schools competition as part of your research project if it involves carrying out a campaigning activity.

Food for Life awards will be judged separately and will be a demonstration of work completed so far on the Food for Life journey.





National Citizen Service - Leicester











National Citizen Service (NCS) is a programme for all 16 and 17 year olds in the UK. It aims to help young people develop into good local citizens, by taking them through several phases of personal and team development. NCS believes in the power of young people to change the world if only given the tools and opportunity. NCS supports the transition to adult life by developing the strength of character and life skills which enable young people to contribute to society with purpose and integrity. Over the last 4 years, young people on NCS with LEBC have completed volunteering hours totalling an equivalent of over 15.6 years, without sleep and have raised over £93,000 for local charities and organisations.

The young people are split into teams of up to 15 young people, and assigned a trained adult mentor who goes through the whole programme with them. Teams then take part in the following phases:

- Adventure Residential
- · Skills Development
- Social Action
- Celebration

Social action projects are projects based within the local community and can vary from revamping community spaces, to fundraising for local charities to campaigning on important social issues. Last year schools in Leicester hosted an NCS group to carry out a project in their school which were very successful.

For Summer 2018 we are looking for hands on projects as well as those that are just fundraising. As I am sure you can imagine across the Summer we will have a lot of young people out and about fundraising and would love to have more some hands on projects where teams can leave a lasting legacy.

Healthier Air for Schools Award





Poor air quality affects people's health and damages the environment. In Leicester there are two main pollutants of concern: nitrogen dioxide and particulate matter. The main source of these pollutants is road traffic, in particular diesel engines.

Leicester has an air quality action plan, a strategic approach to delivering better air quality. This action plan sets out how we will improve air quality and meet the EU standards for nitrogen dioxide, but we cannot achieve this alone. We are asking you to support improving air quality by tackling parking around your school and actively encouraging sustainable transport for students, staff and parents. All schools can achieve the Healthier Air for Schools award.

You can submit your evidence at any time, however submissions will be reviewed monthly. Download the application form from the school extranet schools.leicester.gov.uk/HealthierAir

Email your completed form and evidence to Amita Miles, Amita.Miles@leicester.gov.uk. If we need any extra information or clarification we will be in touch. All schools who achieve the award will be invited to the celebration event at City Hall on Tuesday 12 June 2018.

Your award lasts 12 months from approval. You will need to renew annually to maintain your award.







Supports the transport and healthy living Eco-Schools topics



In order to achieve a **pass** in the Healthier Air for Schools award you need to submit evidence of:

- Achieving at least your Silver Eco-Schools Award with the topic of transport covered
- At least 1 ongoing scheme for example Living Streets - Walk to School, Sustrans Bike It - which has lasted at least 2 school terms.
- 3. At least 1 event involving parents and the community e.g. car-free day, clean air day, raising awareness of the problem of idling*

*(Idling refers to running a vehicle's engine when the vehicle is not in motion i.e. parking outside the school gates)

You can also achieve a **merit** by evidencing other activities in school

 You can submit evidence of activities which have taken place in the last 12 months.

Edi-Net



Edi-net (energy data innovation network) takes readings from Leicester schools with half hourly data (gas, water, electricity and district heating where appropriate). The data is run through the large database and number crunched. This data is compared against the building's previous data from the last 2 years (which is the baseline). For heating data, the system takes into account external temperature through weather station data, so corrects for this if it was an unseasonably cold day.

When consumption is less than that of last year, the smiley faces are greener. When consumption is worse than last year, the smiley faces are more red. If data is in line with last year it is amber. All schools who are on the system can look at where they are on the league table on a daily basis and also in detail at their own consumption — Eco-Schools monitoring complete!

Ditch the Dirt is Practical Action's exciting NEW STEM challenge for pupils aged 8-14 years. Set in the context of accessing clean water in Kenya it enables pupils to model and test filters as a way of making dirty water cleaner. It can also be used to explore ways of making water safe to drink. Ditch the Dirt offers a:

- Perfect challenge to deliver parts of the science, D&T and maths curricula
- Great activity for a science or STEM club, transition or enrichment day
- Way for pupils to gain a CREST Award
- Opportunity to highlight links between STEM and the Global Goals

Healthy Teeth, Happy Smiles!



Would you like to help children in your school have a healthier and happier future? There's a simple step to take - start Supervised Tooth Brushing (STB) in your school. STB takes approximately 5-10 minutes to complete every day. The activity can be carried out at any time during the school day, and can be built in to the existing routine of the school. Some settings do it sat at tables, some at the sink, some sing songs, and some watch a YouTube video and use it as a timer.

Healthy Teeth, Happy Smiles staff ensure that STB is carried out in a way that suits and are on hand to help you through the whole process, **providing all training and resources for free!** Our programme is flexible as we know how busy the school day is! Figures from Public Health England show that 5 year olds in Leicester have amongst the worst rates of tooth decay in England. A recent article published by the BBC showed that tooth decay caused nearly 43,000 operations to remove children's teeth in England.

Tooth decay and oral health problems can affect many aspects of a child's life, including school readiness, self-confidence, concentration and general health and well-being. The worst part is, tooth decay and oral health problems are preventable in many cases.
