Leicester City Council has a dedicated Environmental Education Coordinator based in the Energy and Sustainability Team who works with schools to help them become more sustainable in all that they do.

As well as one-to-one support, schools are able to engage through termly #EcoTeachMeets, staff training, resource planning & workshops, assemblies, Eco-Schools conferences & celebration events and can keep up to date through a dedicated Twitter account, monthly eBulletins and termly newsletters.

The Eco-Schools programme provides exciting opportunities for students in curriculum time as well as outside the classroom. Learning outside the classroom (LOTC) has been identified as 'memorable activities leading to memorable learning and positively contributing to pupil safety'. LOTC provides positive benefits to all groups of young people and supports a rich, relevant, broad and balanced curriculum.

Eco-School Awards

Schools can register for Eco-Schools for free at www.eco-schools.org.uk/register

There are 3 levels of award: Bronze, Silver and Green Flag which were **updated in September 2018**.

At **Bronze** level your school has set up an Eco-committee, carried out a review, created an action plan for three topics and shared this with the whole school.

At **Silver** level your school has done the above plus involved the whole school and wider community and carried out monitoring and evaluation for three indepth pieces of work on three of the ten topics. You have also identified where environmental issues are covered in the curriculum.

At **Green Flag Award** status, your school has done all of the above plus carried out in-depth project work for three of the ten topics and developed an Eco-Code which reflects the topics you have worked on.

Bronze and Silver are self-certified online. For Green Flag, schools submit evidence online and are visited by an external assessor at a mutually agreed time.

Joining Bright Green Future will help young people to gain the knowledge, skills and confidence to embark on a career path which could influence decisions on energy and climate change, and really make a difference to our planet! As part of the programme, participants will carry out activities including:

- Local projects running simple low carbon projects in their local community such as a school eco-day or green week, draught-proofing workshop, energy auditing, renewable energy assessments, litter picking, film nights, lightbulb swaps and more
- **Residential course** a four-day summer school to meet other participants and take part in workshops, talks and hands-on activities
- **Training & learning** both face-to-face and online training sessions exploring energy, sustainability, and how to influence decision-making
- Work placement a 'policy and influence' work–placement or work shadowing opportunity at a professional organisation which influences local or national policy such as a local authority, a governmental agency, or an environmental and landscape planning body (including our partner organisation, the Town and Country Planning Association)
- **Mentoring** help and support throughout the programme from a member of staff at the Centre for Sustainable Energy

Bright Green Future is being run by the Centre for Sustainable Energy (CSE), an established and respected energy charity with a huge range of experience in delivering projects that involve helping households to lower their energy use, addressing fuel poverty, supporting community energy, influencing energy policy, research projects, and much more. CSE staff will be on hand to support and mentor participants throughout the duration of the programme.

Beat the Street!

Beat the Street Leicester is a fun, free game that has seen Leicester transformed into a giant game! Funded by Leicester City Council, and Sport England (National Lottery Funding) and delivered by Intelligent Health, the game is focused around getting people active and changing behaviours to physical activity. Run over 6 weeks, the game challenges the community to see how far they can walk, cycle or run during the 6 weeks and the element of competition enables individuals and teams to collect points as they participate to battle it out for the top spots on the leader board and be in with a chance of winning some prizes. Since the launch on the March 13, we have had a fantastic start with over 9,000 participants taking part.

We have just completed week 3 of the game and we are entering into week 4. We have had some great feedback from children, parents, schools and the local community about how they are enjoying the game and has made getting outside more exciting. Working with Leicester City Council's Environmental Education Coordinator, we have manage to get many primary schools participating in this exciting game.

Leicester Schools Linking Project

The Leicester Schools Linking Project enables young people to meet others from a different community who they may not meet during their normal day to day lives. Through the simple act of working and playing together, stereotypes and prejudices are challenged.

The project carefully prepares the young people through school based work and a "neutral venue" meeting before the young people, staff and parent volunteers spend a day at each other's school working, eating and playing together. The links are embedded further with more visits, letter writing, shared social action projects, emails, video messages etc. The project is an excellent opportunity for really purposeful writing. The hope is that through these friendships, a sense of a shared Leicester identity will be formed, reflecting the words of Jo Cox ..."we are far more united and have far more in common than that which divides us".

In our first year, 2019-20 we had 18 classes involved from 11 city and county schools, both secondary and primary. We are now accepting new schools for 2019-20. We are currently jointly funded by <u>The Linking Network</u> and Leicester City Council.



Air Quality Education 2019

The Air Quality Education Programme is back for the 2019-20 academic year and we are now looking to recruit 15 new schools (any Leicester school). Practical Action – Solar Challenge

Bring a bit of sunshine into your STEM subjects or curriculum enrichment days this year with our new SOLAR Challenge and linked Off-Grid! Design competition. Suitable for pupils aged 8-14 our latest STEM challenge sets the topic of electricity in a real life global context. It enables pupils to learn how solar energy can transform the lives of people living 'off-grid' and challenges them to make recommendations on the use of electricity for a community in Zimbabwe from a limited supply of solar cells. Pupils can also gain a CREST Discovery Award.

Running until June 2019, Off Grid! Design Competition is an exciting opportunity for young people ages 8-14 years to extend their work on the Solar Challenge.

Practical Action will award the winning primary and secondary school a £100 worth of STEM kits, each pupil in the winning team will receive a £10 voucher and STEM book.

The Wilko School Grounds Project is having a fantastic 2019 so far, with some great achievements already! All of the 5 schools taking part in the project have achieved their Bronze Eco-schools award, which is amazing in such a short space of time. We have also been dreaming big for their school grounds to include sensory gardens and pathways, creative spaces, willow domes and for some of our schools making an area which was previously inaccessible, a usable space for outdoor learning. In fact, some schools are well on their way to achieving this dream thanks to the amazing work of the Princes Trust TEAM program who chose the School Grounds Project as their community work project and spent all of half-term volunteering in Woodstock Primary Academy and Ellesmere College. Using the Wilko Maintenance kit, which provided all the tools we could possibly need, they managed to do a tremendous amount of work in both schools. At Woodstock Primary Academy the team transformed a worn-down and disused area which the children from KS1 looked onto from their classrooms into an area the Ecocommittee are now using to plant fruits, vegetables and herbs using their Wilko Healthy Living kit.

Grants and funding opportunities

Nature Grants for Schools

Schools in England, Scotland and Wales are being invited to apply for up to £500 worth of free outdoor equipment and two hours of professional outdoor training as part of the third instalment of Local School Nature Grants. Schools can choose from over 100 different products to deliver outdoor learning and play. The funding is being made available through the charity Learning through Landscapes Local School Nature Grant scheme. The charity has been helping schools across Great Britain since 2017. Funded by the players of People's Postcode Lottery, the grants have so far provided £900,000 worth of equipment to 800 schools. This year it will reach a further 500 schools. There will be four funding rounds throughout the year and the first closing date for applications is the 26th April 2019.

Tree Futures Grant Opens for Application

The Tree Council's Tree Futures Grant scheme has just opened. This scheme replaces the three separate programmes previously available i.e. Trees for Schools, Community Trees and Orchard Windfalls and includes a new category, hedgerow planting, for the first time. Grants of 80% of the costs for projects costing between £300 and £1000 are available. The remaining 20% can come from the applicant organisations own funds, county, district or borough councils. Grants can cover the purchase of trees, hedges and orchard trees plus reasonable costs of stakes, ties, guards, fertiliser, mulch or soil amelioration. The closing date for applications is 5pm on the 17th May 2019.

Riverbank Party at Highfields

Schools from Highfields and Spinney Hills area of the city have been learning all about the impact of inappropriate feeding of our river wildlife and the tremendous impact it has on their growth and development. A theatrical drama performance entitled The Riverbank Party was delivered to over 1500 primary and junior aged children over a week long period.

The performance focuses on educating our future generation on the growing issue of inappropriate food and associated offerings being thrown into our watercourses, by highlighting the consequences of human activity on aquatic wildlife. Its aim is to educate young people who will be encouraged to spread the word to their families and the wider community. Follow up sessions in school will be used to emphasise the key points and to ensure that learning has taken place, the messages correctly conveyed.

The project forms a part of Leicester City Council's "Shared Waters" initiative which, each year, in partnership with the Environment Agency undertakes a series of project activities Leicester's urban related to water environment. The story and performance of Izzy the Brown Rat and her riparian friends was written and directed bv Leicester's Environmental Rangers, Peter Flavel and Vicky Salloway.

Alison Baker, Environment Programme Manager at the Environment Agency, said: "This partnership project with Leicester City Council works with the council's volunteer programme to deliver activities on the city's watercourses with the aim of tackling urban pollution. The drama performances worked extremely well at highlighting the devastating effects of water pollution and served to educate Leicester primary schoolchildren who in turn can help educate their families."

COG Youth Services - Recycling Ambassadors

In May 2018, we started our recycling partnership with Lee Jowett and the Eco-Schools project, with the idea of recycling of various writing instruments across Leicester's schools. We have since expanded our recycling capabilities to include crisp packets, popcorn packets, biscuit wrappers and many more plastics that previous would have been put into landfill or incinerated. With the amazing efforts of 43 Leicester schools we have, so far, managed to divert over 13,000 writing instruments from landfill and incineration. These heroic schools and their amazing eco-warriors have also helped to contribute towards the 6000 crisp packets we have recycled. This has helped to raise £150 that is used to support youth provision across the city. We are looking to launch 2 new projects that schools can take part in. The first is a healthy teeth campaign, which will also open the doors to recycling toothbrushes and toothpaste packaging. The second is our launch of the John Muir Award, an environmental award for children and young people. Thank you to all the schools for what you have helped us to achieve so far and we hope you continue to recycle with us.
