The Eco-Schools programme provides exciting opportunities for students in curriculum time as well as outside the classroom. Learning outside the classroom (LOTC) has been identified as 'memorable activities leading to memorable learning and positively contributing to pupil safety'. LOTC provides positive benefits to all groups of young people and supports a rich, relevant, broad and balanced curriculum.

Eco-School Awards

Schools can register for Eco-Schools for free at <u>www.eco-schools.org.uk/register</u>

There are 3 levels of award: Bronze, Silver and Green Flag which were **updated in September 2018**.

At **Bronze** level your school has set up an Eco-committee, carried out a review, created an action plan for three topics and shared this with the whole school.

At **Silver** level your school has done the above plus involved the whole school and wider community and carried out monitoring and evaluation for three indepth pieces of work on three of the ten topics. You have also identified where environmental issues are covered in the curriculum.

At **Green Flag Award** status, your school has done all of the above plus carried out in-depth project work for three of the ten topics and developed an Eco-Code which reflects the topics you have worked on.

Bronze and Silver are self-certified online. For Green Flag, schools submit evidence online and are normally visited by an external assessor at a mutually agreed time.

The competition is open to any Leicester school and can be done with an individual class or gardening club.

Who would benefit from this project: All schools interested in growing and cooking



Why participate?

- Combine creative culinary skills and gardening, your school is challenged to design a three course menu and grow a minimum of 5 ingredients in your Mealbarrow along with your own growing area. Mealbarrows are then showcased (Covid permitting).
- Raise awareness of healthy eating and cooking in your school. Use as part of your Food for Life and Eco-Schools Awards
- Receive recognition with Bronze, Silver or Gold Grow your Own Grub Award for published criteria on your extended growing area



School commitments

- Attend a free virtual food growing training 4.00 5.30pm 11 March 2021 (recording available if you can't attend)
- You will need to provide compost, seeds and/or plug plants (some seeds provided after the training)
- You will need to reuse the wheelbarrow from last year, or upcycle an old wheelbarrow (ask around in school or get in touch if you are struggling)
- Design and submit a healthy 3 course menu by 19
 May 2021 (judging takes place on Thursday 20 May 2021)
- Grow at least 5 of your ingredients in the **Mealbarrow**
- Deliver and collect the Mealbarrow to the event venue for the celebration day (Covid permitting) -Saturday 3 July 2021 (support will be available)
- Host the judging team during your site visit to view your **Mealbarrow** and extended growing area (where available). Visits (or virtual filming) will be arranged for between **7-11 June 2021.**
- Advertise the competition and the celebration day to parents & families via school newsletters and the school's social media channels

It is intended that the plants are started off in class and then grown in the school grounds in a designated area.
- In **November 2021 to be in with a chance of winning** you will need to submit a selection of photos and a brief report (which can be done by the students) of the garden which shows the evolution of your garden from planning and planting to cooking and eating and final disposal of your pumpkin shells. The report template is provided as part of the downloadable guide.
- As part of the competition you are encouraged to design the garden on a theme of your choice. There will be prizes for first, second and third place.



Virtual Carbon Literacy Training for School Staff, Governors & Trustees



In February 2019, Leicester City Council declared a climate emergency. We are working to develop a climate emergency programme of action to reduce carbon with aim of the city becoming zero carbon.

In order to raise awareness through the community of Leicester we are using the Carbon Literacy Project as a way of accrediting school staff and students to become carbon literate. This equivalent one-day course will enable participants to be carbon Literate and support them deliver their own course back in school

Training: Wednesdays 20 & 27 January, 3 February 2021 4.30-6.30pm each day (you need to attend all 3 sessions to pass) Training Delivered online via Microsoft Teams

Who would benefit from this project: All school staff and governors with an interest in becoming carbon literate, especially those involved in teaching about climate change and the climate emergency in Years 5 and 8.



Why participate?

- Gain a better understanding of how climate change will affect you and those around you
- Become an accredited Carbon Literate individual
- Acquire knowledge and skills to develop your own responses to lowering your carbon footprint, and the carbon footprint of others
- Gain knowledge of delivering a course about basic climate change science to your students
- Help to enable students to become carbon literate

- Create at least one significant action, as an individual, to reduce your own personal carbon footprint

Carbon Literacy Offer for Schools

In February 2019, Leicester City Council declared a climate emergency. We are working to develop a climate emergency programme of action to reduce carbon with the aim of the city becoming zero carbon. In order to raise awareness through the community of Leicester we are using the Carbon Literacy Project as a way of accrediting university students to become carbon literate trainers who will deliver training to school students, making them carbon literate. This exciting project is being delivered in the 2020-21 academic year.

We are offering free training to all primary and secondary students in Leicester City. The project is primarily aimed at Y5 in junior/primary and Y8 in secondary schools, however other year groups can be considered.

The training takes place during a normal school day and a whole class can participate at once. The training will be delivered by Lee and Amy along with university students from DMU and the University of Leicester. You just need to provide a classroom and access to ICT.

Pumpkin Garden Winners 2020

Although we were unable to host the Pumpkin Garden competition in all its glory this year, several schools managed take part with seeds sent out in the first lockdown.

We are pleased to announce that Mayflower Primary School and Children's Hospital School were joint winners. Congratulations!!! You can read more about their journeys below.







Mayflower Primary's garden was planted by key worker children during the first lockdown, and harvested by children in Years 2, 3, 4 and 6 when they visited the school allotment the autumn term. The garden was designed with raised beds for beans, cabbages, brussels sprouts, carrots and potatoes, and an open area for the pumpkins to roam. They were planted to grow horizontally as there was a large area to cover. They grew several varieties including Jack Be Little, Expert, Cornell's Bush Delicata, Butternut Squash, Sweet Dumplings (trailing) and some Sunstripe courgette. They all grew well, but the Expert seemed to really thrive in the space.

With their bountiful harvest that have had a variety of pumpkin curries and pumpkin cake. One of the pumpkins was taken home and made into a delicious Spicy Pumpkin Soup for the staff to enjoy as part of the RHS Campaign for School Gardening Big Soup Share.





Children's Hospital School garden was tended by students in KS3 and 4, Ms Whiteley, the caretaker and cook.

They decided to use brand new raised beds because they are really long and one of the students said that the pumpkins could trail all the way down the beds. All pumpkins were grown horizontally. Because of Lockdown the caretaker had to provide some care and watered them when needed.

They sowed Jack Be Little, but this only started to produce pumpkins late on in September. However the Expert variety worked really well. They all grew a successful crop of courgette and a massive marrow!!!! Two green pumpkins were used for soup and the large Expert for carving.





Would you like to join the fastest growing school energy programme in the UK?

Schools who have completed the LESS CO₂ programme, over one year, saved an average of 17 tonnes of CO₂ and 14% on their energy bills.

A recent LESS CO₂ school said that "the programme fired-up the whole school to reduce CO₂ emissions. The staff who attended were inspired and brought that inspiration back to school to invigorate the whole school community."

The LESS CO, programme is a free programme supporting schools across the UK to reduce their energy use, engage with their staff and students about energy, and teach about sustainability. LESS CO_2 is run by <u>Ashden</u>, a charity that champions and supports leaders in sustainable energy to accelerate the transition to a low-carbon world.

Staff from schools taking part in the programme attend 4 half-day workshops spread across a year, each covering a different aspect of energy saving at your school.

Climate Emergency Declared by Attenborough Learning Trust ATTENBOROUGH LEARNING

Attenborough Learning Trust is the first trust in Leicester to declare a climate emergency in December 2020. The Trust has taken the action because:

- They believe that climate change poses a very great threat to the wellbeing of present and future residents of the city, and to Leicester's future success and prosperity.
- Cities including our own have been estimated to be responsible for about 70% of worldwide carbon dioxide emissions. We believe we have a responsibility to play our part in tackling the challenge.
- Leicester has a lot to gain from acting decisively now, rather than waiting for other cities and other countries to act first.

The Trust has put together an action plan to reduce carbon emissions and prepare for climate change including:

- Switching to renewable energy contracts on energy when they are renewed in all schools within the Trust
- Investigate options and install solar PVs on roofs (where funding allows)
- Investigate and install LED lights and other energy efficiency measures (where funding allows)
- Develop curriculum opportunities within and between schools to learn about sustainability
- Support current Eco-teams and establish Eco-teams in schools where they don't exist to lead on Sustainability
- Develop a trust wide sustainability policy and more detailed action plan
- Encourage all staff and students to participate in active travel (walking, cycling and scooting)

eBikes for Schools

The Walking & Cycling Team from the Leicester City Council are proud to present 6 electric bikes for the use of businesses (which includes schools) as part of Transport Strategy's plan to encourage Leicester to be a cycling city!

Our commitments

- We bring you a fleet of 6 electric bikes with cycle bags and helmets on an agreed date & time
- We provide training for staff to help them use the e-bike
- We assist with an on-call option in case there are any issues.
- We give you a hire period of 4 weeks in total! eBikes are able to provide 15+ miles per full charge.

Enhanced support provided by Sustrans

- Personal Travel Planning to help you plan the route that is best for you including use of keyworker corridors where appropriate
- Journey buddying riding with you when you first give the route a go
- Use of a Sustrans helmet cam e.g. we can pre-film the ride to show you and or for you to record their ride to show clips of it to the students
- -Film interview with them which they can then show to their school students

Your commitments

- You provide time for staff to participate in training typically 1-2 hours in an afternoon on the same day that the bikes and equipment is delivered
- You provide safe and secure bike storage on site
- Participants engage with students and staff to discuss challenges and benefits of eBikes e.g. through an assemblies or workshop
- Provide feedback after the month.

The cost of involvement in this scheme is £270 per school, however we can assist you with an applications for a grant to cover this. This cost covers equipment hire and training time.

If your scheme is successful with staff we can support with a further grant of £5000 to purchase eBikes to be used by school staff.

Eco-Schools Adapted Criteria



Eco-Schools are aware that it may be impossible to achieve the required criteria given new regulations and ways of working. With this in mind they have adapted the criteria to enable your school to obtain your Green Flag Award. Full details can be found on the <u>website</u> and the key changes are summarised below.

Step One: Eco-Committee

Your Eco-Committee can now be formed from one year group or bubble.

- The Eco-Schools team understand that parents or other adult representatives may not currently be able to attend Eco-Committee meeting but meetings can be held virtually.
- Inform the whole school who is on the Eco-Committee in a way that is safe to do so (newsletter, Eco-Board etc).
- Remember to invite all the young people and school staff who helped out during lockdown on to your Eco-Committee.

Step Two: Environmental Review

This can now be carried out by one year group or bubble.

• Ensure sure the rest of the school know the results of your Environmental Review.

Step Three: Action Plan

- As this is a working document, do not worry if you have to re-think plans over the course of the year due to changes in school restrictions.
- Remember that not all actions need to have been completed in order to apply for your Eco-Schools Green Flag, we would just expect to see that implementation has begun.
- No eco-action is too small! If your grand plans have been cut back due to restrictions that is not a problem as long as you can undertake at least one action for each of the three or five Eco-Schools topics you have chosen.

Step Four: Curriculum Links

• No change, three examples from across different curriculum areas or year groups are still required.

Step Five: Informing and Involving

- If your Eco-Board has been removed due to school deep cleaning then you will be able to upload all the information you wished to display on your online Green Flag application.
- During this time, it might be difficult for actions to involve the whole school and wider community, the Eco-Schools team understands this and will accept evidence of actions involving only parts of a school.
- If you set eco-actions such as our #EcoSchoolsAtHome tasks to be carried during lockdown, please include these as evidence towards your Eco-Schools Green Flag.

Step Six: Monitoring and Evaluation


- This particular step has always been about reviewing and adapting, never has this been truer. Did your indoor plants wilt during lockdown? Did you miss out on your yearly sunflower competition? We want to know how you have adapted your Action Plan ideas, let's share this information to help others with their Eco-Schools work.
- Please remind your pupils not to be disheartened if their eco-actions have not gone to plan. Use this as a tool to help young people become more resilient, we are sure they will be more successful next time.

Step Seven: Eco-Code

• No change; although the whole school community may now not be involved in the creation of your Eco-Code, especially if applying for your first Eco-Schools Green Flag.
